Go to sleep my flesh and blood,

Go to sleep, sleep tight ...

Listen to the voices you hear. Look at the beautiful colours you see...

Activity 2

i) Now that you have seen the **power point**, the **flipbook** and the **video** of the three poems, what similarities and what differences can you spot among the lullabies by Hikmet, by Ritsos and by Lorca?

ii) With the members of your group, write a small paragraph discussing the following question on the lullaby that you can find on your worksheet:

In the lullaby you have studied, there are references to several occupations that the poet wants his son to follow. Following the order in which they are mentioned in the poem, define the characteristics of each job.



Activity 3

Homework
